FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS⁴

State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

Arkansas Department of Health

\$486,466

The Arkansas Department of Health is using PREP funds to work with the Centers for Youth and Families through community-based programming. The program supports evidence-based programs for youth in the foster care system in Pulaski, Garland, and Lonoke counties.

Title V State Abstinence Education Grant

The Arkansas Department of Health is using their grant to provide both school- and community-based programming for youth ages 12–19 in 11 counties.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN ARKANSAS

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 54,360 women in Arkansas in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 13,200 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 6,400 births and 4,800 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Arkansas would be 49% higher.⁶
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X–supported centers in Arkansas saved \$97.5 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2015, the amount of federal funding Arkansas received for Title X decreased by \$494,775, resulting in 26,468 fewer (35%) patients served.
- In Arkansas, 96 clinics receive support from Title X. The local health departments operate all 96 clinics.
