OIC of South Florida's Teen Pregnancy Prevention program, Project P.A.U.S.E, intends to help youth prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease (STDs) and HIV/AIDS; achieve their academic and personal goals; understand the risks associated with unprotected sex; and succeed in the endeavors they undertake to educate their community and peers. Project P.A.U.S.E participants not only receive teen pregnancy and STD and HIV/AIDS prevention education, but are equipped with solid decision making skills that promote post-secondary education and career preparation. Project P.A.U.S.E prepares students for leadership roles. The Project P.A.U.S.E Youth Leadership Council partners with local community-based organizations, local government, colleges and universities, and local industry in an effort to develop the skills necessary for youth to be effective change agents. Project P.A.U.S.E encourages youth to pause before acting, pause to consider the possibilities, pause to develop a plan that supports their future and the future of their community, pause to educate themselves and those around them, and pause to effectively mobilize their peers and the community around positive action.

The goal of Trinity Church's Plan Be___ program is to see reduced rates in teen pregnancy and births, sexually transmitted infection (STIs), and disparities among racial/ethnic groups. To achieve this goal, the Plan Be___ program implements evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs for middle school-aged youth, and the most at-risk high school-aged populations. Trinity and partners will implement the appropriate programs with 6,000 youth annually in Miami-Dade County Public Schools and community-based organizations. Trinity's intervention community is comprised of 20 zip codes in Miami-Dade County. Services are delivered within the context of a trauma-informed, gender-responsive, culturally competent, family-centered program.

Program model: *Teen Outreach Program™*

The Florida Department of Health (DOH) will work with the county health department and the local school district in 26 non-metropolitan counties across the state to implement the *Teen Outreach Program™* (TOP) for students in 9th grade. The Florida DOH will implement TOP in 22 intervention schools reaching 7,700 students in years 1-2; 44 intervention schools reaching 15,400 students in years 2-3; and 86 intervention schools reaching 30,100 students in years 3-4. The project also includes an independently conducted rigorous evaluation.

JWB Children's Services Council of Pinellas County

Program model: *Children's Aid Society - Carrera Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program*

Juvenile Welfare Board Children's Services Council of Pinellas County will implement *Children's Aid Society - Carrera Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program* to 60 predominately African-American youth, ages 11-13. The program will be provided in a community center in a high-need, high-risk, urban area of St. Petersburg, FL where teen birth rates and STIs are substantially higher than the state average. The overarching goals of this project are to prevent teen pregnancy, improve work-related skills, and increase access to medical and dental care.

Program model: *Becoming a Responsible Teen (BART) and Reducing the Risk*

OIC of Broward County will implement the *Becoming a Responsible Teen (BART) and Reducing the Risk* curricula to 4,500 African-American middle school and high school youth in Broward County. They will partner with four community-based organizations to implement the program at sites

within seven specific neighborhoods of Broward County. The goal of the program is to expand teen pregnancy prevention education throughout Broward County to reduce teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections among teens.

Planned Parenthood of Greater Orlando, Inc.

Program models: *SiHLE* and *Safer Sex*

Planned Parenthood of Greater Orlando (PPGO) will implement the Teens RISE! (Really•Important•Sex•Education) Project targeting female adolescents ages 14-19 through two teen pregnancy prevention programs. The first program, *Sisters Informing, Healing, Living and Empowering* (SiHLE), will reach 450 girls over the 5-year period in two zip codes with the highest teen birth rates. The second goal of the Teens RISE! Project is to provide a clinic-based intervention program, *Safer Sex*, to sexually active female adolescents providing information on preventing STDs. The *Safer Sex* intervention is available at PPGO's main clinic location, in collaboration with referrals from the Orange County Healthy Start Coalition. This program will reach 1,010 sexually active females 15-19 years during the 5-year program.

Switchboard of Miami

Program model: *All4You!*

The Switchboard of Miami will implement Project WISE (Wisdom- Independence- Support- Education) serving approximately 800 high-risk urban youth each year. The *All4You!* program model was selected based on a needs assessment of the community and the targeted areas. Project WISE will be implemented in identified schools targeting Haitian youth. The goal of the project is to enhance protective factors and positive health behaviors related to the prevention of HIV, other STDs, and unintended pregnancy.

Trinity Church, Inc.

Program models: *Becoming a Responsible Teen (BART)* and *Reducing the Risk*

Trinity Church, Inc. proposes to serve primarily middle and high school African-American and Latino youth ages 12-19 living in poverty. The purpose of the project is to expand teen pregnancy prevention services in Miami-Dade county public and charter schools over the next five years. The project will be offered through school-based and community-based organization sites. The project plans to serve approximately 5,200 youth over the five-year project period. The overall goals of this project are to effectively reduce teen pregnancy and STDs among the target population.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN FLORIDA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 159,720 women in Florida in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 38,700 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 18,800 births and 14,000 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Florida would be 24% higher.⁶
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in Florida saved \$145.4 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2014, the amount of federal funding Florida received for Title X decreased by \$2,303,084, resulting in 65,340 fewer (28%) patients served.
- In Florida, 160 clinics receive support from Title X. They include health department clinics (153) and Planned Parenthood clinics (7).
