## FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS<sup>4</sup>

### State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

Idaho Department of Health and Welfare

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare is using PREP funds to provide evidence-based programs through seven sub-grantees, primarily local health districts. Programming takes place in school and community-based settings, focusing on Latino youth, runaway and homeless teens, and youth in high need areas.

### Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program (TPPP) — Tier 2

Program models: *Linking Families and Teens (LiFT)*

Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest and the Hawaiian Islands (PPGNW) intends to reduce teen pregnancy rates, increase use of contraceptives, and delay initiation of sexual activity among rural, 9-12th grade youth by increasing parent-child connectedness, and increasing youth's self-efficacy, knowledge, and skill related to sexual health and pregnancy prevention in Washington, **Idaho**, Oregon, Utah, Alaska, and Hawaii. To achieve this goal, PPGNW implements LiFT, a program designed specifically for rural communities that brings 9-12th grade youth and their parenting adult together to share family values, strengthen family bonds, and talk about healthy relationships and sexual health.

The Northwest Coalition for Adolescent Health will deliver evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs to scale across four states, in seven communities with disparately high teen pregnancy rates. The communities are **Caldwell, ID**; Salem, OR; South Salt Lake City, Utah; Centralia, WA; East Tacoma, WA; and Mt. Vernon, WA. In each community there are three distinct implementation settings ranging from faith-based institutions, to foster care youth programs, to high school settings and school based health centers.

Planned Parenthood of Greater Washington and North Idaho

Program models: *Project AIM, All4You!, Get Real, Making Proud Choices!, Seventeen Days, SHARP*

The goal of the Healthy Youth Collaborative is to reach a minimum of 2,000 youth across four communities in Washington by bringing evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs to scale. To achieve this goal, Planned Parenthood of Greater Washington and North Idaho implements Healthy Youth Collaborative programming within each community, in four different settings including middle

and high schools, health centers, community-based organizations, and juvenile justice facilities. A curriculum has been chosen so that there is an appropriate evidence-based program for each setting.

### **Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program (TPPP) — Tier 1**

Program model: *Teen Outreach Program*<sup>TM</sup>

Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest (PPGNW) is a partnership among six Planned Parenthood affiliates collaborating to administer the *Teen Outreach Program*<sup>TM</sup> across five states. The partnership proposes to target high-risk youth particularly of African American, Native American, Russian and Ukrainian races/ethnicities in 27 counties in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. The program will serve 8,000 youth in grades 7-12 (ages 12-17) in school and in after-school programs. The project also includes an independently conducted rigorous evaluation. The outcomes of the program are to successfully reduce teen pregnancy rates, decrease onset of sexual activity, increase contraception use among sexually active youth, decrease academic failure and increase positive attitudes toward service and community engagement.

## **TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN IDAHO**

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 16,730 women in Idaho in 2013.<sup>5</sup> These services helped women avoid 4,000 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 1,900 births and 1,400 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Idaho would be 48% higher.<sup>6</sup>
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in Idaho saved \$32.7 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2014, the amount of federal funding Idaho received for Title X decreased by \$373,597, resulting in 6,569 fewer (27%) patients served.
- In Idaho, 35 clinics receive support from Title X. They include health department clinics (34) and Planned Parenthood clinics (1).
