The Health Care Education and Training (HCET) Clinton County Youth RISE! Project works to improve the behavioral, social, emotional, and sexual health outcomes and reduce teen birth and pregnancy rates for the youth of Clinton County, Indiana. To achieve this goal, the RISE! Project provides evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programming in four settings in Clinton County: Frankfort Elementary, Middle, and High Schools and in community-based organizations. Based on the needs of the community, HCET has selected four evidence-based programs to implement in each setting.

Centerstone of Tennessee's Be in Charge 2 program implements evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention (TPP) programs for 60,000 youth age 10-19 throughout 85 counties, including 60 counties in Tennessee and 14 counties in Kentucky with the highest teen birth rates. In **Indiana**, 11 counties with the highest teen birth rates will receive outreach and resources to train professionals working with high-risk youth. Outreach services will be provided to communities in the same geographic area and are

designed to educate youth and adults as well as increase awareness through the use of social media, educational presentations, local community capacity building, resource development and distribution, event sponsorship, and stakeholder training to sustain effective TPP efforts beyond the end of the grant.

Program model or strategy: *Planned Potential*

PATH, Inc. (A Positive Approach to Teen Health) is delivering the longitudinal three-year curriculum *Planned Potential* to 12 Indiana middle schools in the rural Indiana counties of La Porte, Starke, Jasper, and Pulaski. The *Planned Potential* program is a combination of *Project AIM (Adult Identity Mentoring)* with the addition of new materials published by PATH known as “Pathblazer.” This intervention incorporates a positive youth development strategy with an abstinence approach to sex education and aims to increase youth’s ability to make healthy choices regarding high-risk behaviors, reduce teen pregnancy and STDs/HIV, and also increase high school completion.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN INDIANA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 30,660 women in Indiana in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 7,400 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 3,600 births and 2,700 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Indiana would be 37% higher.⁶
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in Indiana saved \$42.4 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2015, the amount of federal funding Indiana received for Title X decreased by \$898,869, resulting in 15,103 fewer (33%) patients served.
- In Indiana, 36 clinics receive support from Title X. They include federally qualified health centers (14), private non-profits (12), Planned Parenthood clinics (6), health department clinics (1), universities (1), school-based health centers (1) and hospitals (1).
