FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS⁴

State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

Minnesota Department of Health

The Minnesota state PREP grant program is directing their funding towards evidence-based programs in community-based organizations, juvenile detention centers, local public health agencies, social service agencies, clinics, foster care facilities, runaway/homeless youth facilities, tribal governments, and school alternative centers. Funded programs must serve at least one target at-risk population.

Title V State Abstinence Education Grant

Minnesota provides a sub-award to St. Paul Ramsey County Public Health, which offers programming to 11-14 year olds in school and community-based settings. Funds also support a parent education component and a community/youth mentoring project.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program (TPPP) — Tier 1

The Hennepin County Human Services and Public Health Department and Better Together Hennepin Initiative, a unit of local Hennepin County government, intends to reduce teen birth rates by 30% among adolescents age 10 to 19 in communities with the highest teen birth rates in Hennepin County. In order to achieve this goal, the program implements evidence-based curricula in 25 schools and community sites throughout the Minneapolis north and central neighborhoods, Richfield, Robbinsdale, and Brooklyn Center. The project ensures that young people are exposed to sequential, consistent, and reinforcing evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programming multiple times over the course of their adolescence. Better Together Hennepin will partner with existing systems serving youth in these communities to implement It's OUR Future evidence-based programs to scale in the target communities.

Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest and the Hawaiian Islands (PPGNW) intends to prevent teen pregnancy and sexual transmitted infections in the LGBTQ youth population. In order to achieve this goal, PPGNW implements the In•clued program delivered in 14 communities in Alaska, Massachusetts, **Minnesota**, Montana, Oregon, Utah, and Washington through the PPGNW Teen Council Peer Education program. Each teen council group will deliver trainings to two different audiences: 1) IN•clued for health care staff and providers, a three hour workshop delivered by peer teen educators in two 1.5 hour segments that include best practices for working with LGBTQ youth; and 2) IN•clued for LGBTQ youth, a three hour interactive workshop delivered by teen peer educators to their peers who identify as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, or queer/questioning. The workshop includes education related to sexual risk prevention and information about how to access sexual health services.

Program models: *Teen Outreach Program™* and *Safer Sex*

The Hennepin County Research, Planning, and Development Department (RPD) will implement a community-wide initiative targeting eight specific cities in the county (urban and suburban). The project, entitled “It’s Your Future,” will implement the *Teen Outreach Program™* (TOP) and *Safer Sex* programs. *TOP* will be implemented in 15 middle and high schools and incorporated into classrooms by local teachers co-facilitated with staff from community agencies. The *Safer Sex* program will be implemented across seven health care providers in 16 clinics by local staff. They will serve about 13,440 youth through *TOP* and 14,000 youth through *Safer Sex* over the five years. The project also includes an independently conducted rigorous evaluation.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN MINNESOTA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 49,200 women in Minnesota in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 11,900 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 5,800 births and 4,300 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Minnesota would be 55% higher.⁶
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in Minnesota saved \$52.7 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2014, the amount of federal funding Minnesota received for Title X decreased by \$454,267. In 2014, the number of patients served was approximately 57,000, which is comparable to the number of patients served in 2010.
- In Minnesota, 41 clinics receive support from Title X. They include private non-profits (18), Planned Parenthood clinics (15), hospitals (7), and health department clinics (1).
