FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS⁴

State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

NE Department of Health and Human Services

The Nebraska PREP state grant program is supporting six public and private entities that provide evidence-based programs to youth with a special focus on racial/ethnic minorities, as well as youth in foster care and the juvenile system.

Title V State Abstinence Education Grant

NE Department of Health and Human Services

\$351,556

The Nebraska Title V State Abstinence Education Program provides funding to three local entities to serve youth ages 10-14 in six counties. The programs target African- American, Latino, and Native American youth, as well as youth in foster care and the juvenile justice system.

Planned Parenthood of the Heartland plans to implement evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention (TPP) programs in six counties in Iowa and **Nebraska** through the proposed project. These communities include Woodbury, Pottawattamie, Mills and Page Counties in Iowa and Dakota and Douglas Counties in **Nebraska**. The teen birth rates across the six counties range from 32.7 to 51.2 per 1,000 teen girls. In each county, Planned Parenthood of the Heartland will implement *Get Real* and *Draw the Line/Respect the Line* in middle schools; *Be Proud! Be Responsible!* and *Making Proud Choices!* in high schools; and *Get Real* and *Draw the Line/Respect the Line* in community-based organizations. Overall, the project will serve nearly 5,700 youth over the five-year project.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN NEBRASKA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 21,650 women in Nebraska in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 5,200 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 2,500 births and 1,900 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Nebraska would be 42% higher.⁶
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in Nebraska saved \$38.6 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2015, the amount of federal funding Nebraska received for Title X decreased by \$75,848 resulting in 355 fewer (1.3%) patients served.
- In Nebraska, 27 clinics receive support from Title X. They include private non-profits (10), federally qualified health centers (7), hospitals (5), Planned Parenthood clinics (2), health department clinics (2), and Indian Health Services clinics (1).
