## **FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS<sup>4</sup>**

### **State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)**

South Dakota Department of Health

\$250,000

The South Dakota PREP grant program is working with the Department of Corrections and the Department of Social Services. The departments provide evidence-based programming in schools for incarcerated youth and community-based programming for youth in foster care, with a focus on Native American youth.

### **Title V State Abstinence Education Grant**

The South Dakota Department of Health administers the State Abstinence Education Grant program in collaboration with two local agencies. The funded programs target young people ages 9-11, with a focus on Native American youth, in 10 South Dakota counties.

Program model: *Adult Identity Mentoring (Project AIM); Making Proud Choices! (MPC)*

Rural America Initiative (RAI) intends to reduce sexual risk behaviors among American Indian low-income youth in Pennington County, South Dakota by helping youth develop life skills, healthy behaviors, and a sense of purpose through replication of evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs in a supportive, safe environment. RAI is implementing in three settings, middle school (AIM), High School and Alternative School (MPC) throughout Pennington County Public Schools.

Program model: *Project AIM* (Adult Identity Mentoring)

Rural America Initiatives (RAI) is a community-based Native American governed organization that serves Native families in Rapid City, South Dakota. Ateyapi Identify Mentoring Program (AIMP) will replicate *Project AIM* with Native American youth ages 11-14 attending public middle schools and their parents. AIMP will help Native youth make safe choices about sexual behavior, through enhancing motivation to achieve a positive future. The overarching goal for this project is to reduce risks associated with sexual behavior. The project will specifically target services to encourage youth to delay sexual initiation and increase their knowledge base regarding safe sexual behaviors.

Program model or strategy: *Project AIM* integrated with *Vision Quest*

Rural America Initiatives' Ateyapi Identity Mentoring Program is integrating the American Indian Lakota cultural intervention *Vision Quest*, a Lakota American Indian practice that facilitates finding purpose in life, with the evidence-based *Project AIM* youth development model. The program targets Native American youth, ages 11-14, attending public middle school, primarily low-income, and many from multi-risk families. The overall goal for the Ateyapi Identity Project is to help Native youth make safe choices, especially about sexual behavior, through enhancing motivation to achieve a positive future, and to help youth understand the concept of the Native American legacy.

Program model or strategy: *Circle of Life*  
\$924,543

This project targets 13-15 year olds enrolled in after-school programs at eight Native Boys and Girls clubs located in rural tribal reservation areas in North Dakota and **South Dakota**, representing 10 different tribes. The curriculum, *Circle of Life*, is a theory-based sexual risk reduction intervention designed specifically for Native youth that uses familiar symbols, stories, and ways of learning to build knowledge and skills to bring about behavior change in Native youth. The project will digitize *Circle of Life* and adapt components to accommodate shortened after-school programming. The project will also adapt *Circle of Life* to reflect tribal-specific content through digital, readily accessible techniques, such as digital story telling. The goal of this project is to scientifically evaluate the effectiveness of *Circle of Life* in reducing the probability of behavior resulting in pregnancy.

## TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN SOUTH DAKOTA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 6,200 women in South Dakota in 2014.<sup>5</sup> These services helped women avoid 1,500 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 700 births and 500 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in South Dakota would be 49% higher.<sup>6</sup>
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in South Dakota saved \$12.7 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2015, the amount of federal funding South Dakota received for Title X decreased by \$221,085, resulting in 4,148 fewer (41%) patients served.
- In South Dakota, 41 clinics receive support from Title X. They include health department clinics (32), federally qualified health centers (4), private non-profits (3), universities (1), and hospitals (1).
