FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS⁴

State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

Wisconsin Department of Health Services

\$932,364

Wisconsin is using its PREP grant to provide funding to six community-based organizations to implement evidence-based programs in high need areas. Programming focuses on African-American and Latino youth, youth in the juvenile justice and foster care system, and youth at risk of dropping out of school.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Milwaukee intends to reduce teen birth rates in six targeted zip codes in the city of Milwaukee by providing evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. Important goals of this program include improving understanding of the morbidity and impact of sexually transmitted disease (STDs) and unintended pregnancies among minority communities in Milwaukee; raising community awareness of the alarming state of STD infection and unintended pregnancies in Milwaukee and the disproportionate impact of these preventable health conditions on minority communities; identifying opportunities for creative resource sharing, service coordination, and program development among existing STD, HIV, family planning, and other public health services to improve access and utilization of existing services; and mobilizing community leadership into action to secure new resources to implement proven public health STD and pregnancy prevention interventions and services.

The Goodman Center will implement three evidence-based program models within their existing MERIT (Madison Empowering Responsibly in Teens) program to middle school and high school youth: *¡Cuidate!, Be Proud! Be Responsible!* and *Making a Difference!* The grantee will serve approximately 550 predominantly low-income African-American and Latino youth through various community partners and schools with these three evidence-based program models.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN WISCONSIN

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 35,740 women in Wisconsin in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 8,700 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 4,200 births and 3,100 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Wisconsin would be 44% higher.⁶
- By helping women avoid unintended pregnancies and the births that would follow, the services provided at Title X-supported centers in Wisconsin saved \$71.6 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2015, the amount of federal funding Wisconsin received for Title X decreased by \$132,000, resulting in 22,674 fewer (39%) patients served.
- In Wisconsin, 20 clinics receive support from Title X. They include private non-profits (11) and Planned Parenthood clinics (9).

⁵ “Title X-supported centers” are supported by a mix of funding sources (in addition to Title X funding) including Medicaid, funding from state and local governments, private grants and fundraising, reimbursement from commercial insurance, patient fees, and federal grants.

⁶ “Publicly-funded family planning services” refers to all public funding sources that support family planning services, including Medicaid, Title X, and other state and federal resources.
